I have seen bits and pieces of this history scattered on the Internet, but I have never found the early history of sewing machines gathered together like this, what a treasure! There are one hundred illustrated pages (black and white drawings, and some black and white photos), showing machines from the 1800's, with descriptions of each. There are almost 50 pages of machines from 1900 to 1910. There are helpful pages on dating Singers by their serial numbers. Not all the machines in this book are Singers, so as a reference, he includes listings of other sewing machine companies and where they were located. The author gives a British and an American value for each machine, these are probably dated.
