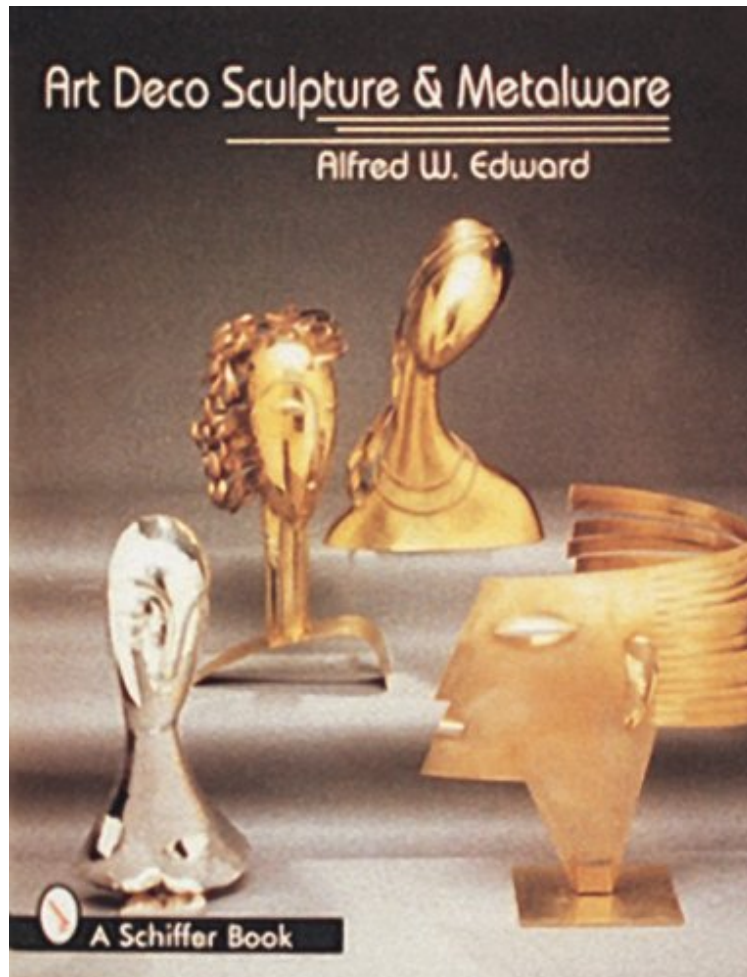

Art Deco Sculpture: Limited in scope and one really fatal flawBy Denise R.The description of the book provided by the publisher (shown above) is very incomplete, leading to confusion about what this book covers.The blurb on the the book's dustjacket is a little more complete: "This book contains over 200 photographs and illustrations of European Art Deco metalware, covering nearly a century of design and manufacture. It discusses Art Deco's most significant artists, as well as their predecessors and modern counterparts. The book provides an introduction to the styles of Hagenauer, WMF, the Bauhaus, Ferdinand Priess, Chiparus, Brancusi and Brandt, among other important metalworkers of the era."That's a pretty fair description of what's found in the book, which focuses upon high-end Art Deco metalware from Europe, by the very well-known artists.Marks for each maker are shown, though it's not at all clear if these are the only marks for these makers.The

various artists are each presented with some text, history, and an array of photos. There are many photos, mostly of generous size. Some are of good quality. Unfortunately, many others tend to be too dark, making any detail hard to see. Some items are photographed against garish, brightly-colored backgrounds, which reflect badly on the shiny metal. (For instance, a kelly-green photography background renders a silver-plated bowl an unpleasant greenish color.) Some photos are black-and-white, others in color. There are also some drawings, rendered in heavy black ink. There's a price guide in the back, but of course this book was published so long ago, the values are no longer accurate. The items shown in this book are mostly high-end art pieces; if you're looking for a guide to things you're likely to come across when visiting your average antique mall, or estate sale (though it's remotely possible), this probably isn't it. However, if you're looking for some information about well-known European Art Deco metal artists and don't mind poor photos, you may find this useful. 5 of 5 people found the following review helpful.
