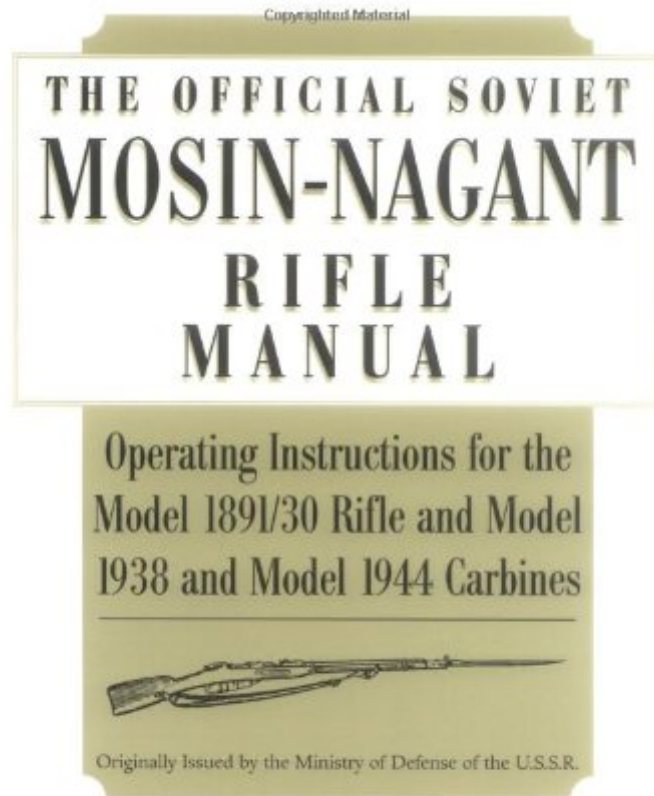

By Krazykat After reading through most of the manual, (skipping the near end) I was able to fully deconstruct, modify, and reassemble my M91/30 with almost no effort. The only problems I came across, were when I disassembled the bolt for the first time. It took me a good 5 minutes to figure out how to put the bolt back together. If not for the book, it might have been impossible. The book itself contains everything you would want to know about the rifle. From how to use the rear dovetail sights, to cleaning the rifle properly. The only reason not to like the book, is that it makes you think a little bit about what you're doing. It lists every part and its function in the rifle, and how to use that part. So, in conclusion, if you want a good book on a great vintage weapon, this is the book for you. If you are more into collecting the rifle as a hobby, it's still a good book to have in case anything breaks.
