

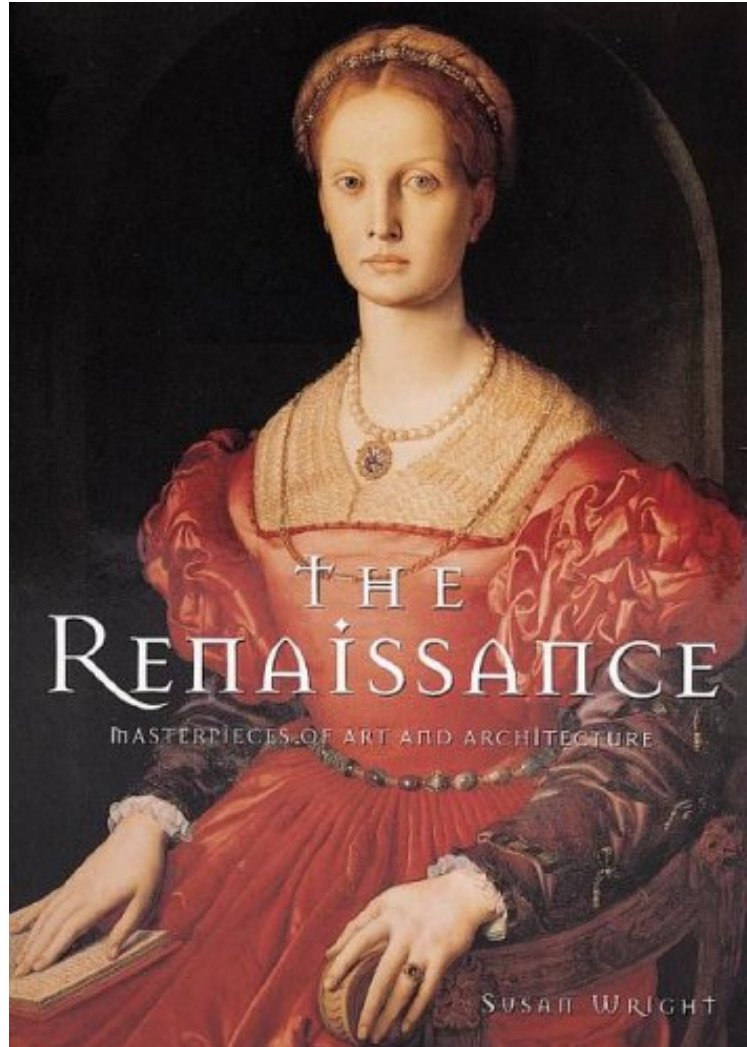

The organization of the artworks is good -- not in a jumble, like wth some art books, but in a fashion that allows you to trace the development of the Renaissance from early to high, to compare the Italian Renaissance and the Northern Renaissance. Useful comparisons are also drawn between some individual works, such as the reclining Venuses of Giorgione and Titian, or Perugino's "Christ

Giving the Keys to St. Peter" and Raphael's "Marriage of the Virgin." It is not a long book, but the artworks are well chosen, and attention is paid to sculpture and architecture as well, from Cellini's miniatures, to the Villa Rotonda and Palazzo Farneze, to the glorious sculptures of Michelangelo and Donatello, among others.<sup>3</sup> of 6 people found the following review helpful. By CJ, from Kalamazoo, MI use this text as a classroom reference as I teach Greek mythology (which heavily influenced the art of the Renaissance) and Shakespeare (who came at the tail end of the Renaissance). I find that the large, full-color illustrations of artwork and architecture helps students picture some of the stories and time periods we study. We discuss how some of the movements of the time period (which are clearly explained in the text of this book) can be seen in Shakespeare as well as in the art, architecture and even the fashion of the time period. (Although fashion is regrettably not covered in the text, the ornate influences in the artworld did carry over to the dress of the time period). I do have to admit that the text may be difficult if you are not already familiar with some of the places and events of the Renaissance, but in that way the text may also serve as an introduction. Whatever interests you, research further. In the meantime, marvel at the art wrought by those Renaissance masters!

Western art has evolved through a wide range of styles, each characterized by its own unique philosophy and masterpieces.
