Written in the style of Pat Conroy, The Unforgettable Summer touched me on several levels as someone who grew up in South Carolina in the 1950s and as a Christian. My father retired from the Navy in 1956, and we settled down in St. Stephen, a small Lowcountry town about 45 miles north of Charleston. Rons imagery brought back many memories as a young boy.

One example concerning the use of DDT, I remember how large trucks would drive up and down the streets on a weekly basis spraying out huge clouds of DDT to combat the mosquitoes as we kids would run along behind them playing in what we unknowingly thought was simply fog. Another example dealing with fishing and snakes, one of my favorite pastimes was fishing with my cousins on Lake Moultrie. Normally it was from the bank, but occasionally we would use a flat-bottomed boat. Snakes would sometimes fall from overhanging tree limbs into the boat and cause great consternation. The readiness with which fathers and male relatives used corporal punishment struck home as well. The language was not as earthy as I remembered as a young fellow, but in his foreword, Ron made it clear that he hoped the book would provide clean, wholesome entertainment. He also read chapters to his grandchildren. As a grandfather myself, I would have extreme difficulty reading to or writing for my grandchildren anything that contained off-color language. That also probably accounts for why Ron never used the N-word in this book. The book is entertaining and suspenseful. I was not sure how the hostage situation would turn out, and Ron ended it well. I also liked how Ron gave insights as to what later happened to several of the characters, in some instances years later, thereby tying up loose ends. I look forward to reading new works by this author.

For anyone who grew up in the 50s, you'll recognize many of the cultural and social issues of the day, some of them will make you smile, some will make you cringe. The author shows us the power of loving relationships, respect and human dignity as well as the destructiveness of prejudice and hate. I would have liked the book to end with the end of the boys' unforgettable summer with an epilogue filling us in to maybe ten years down the road. I would like to see that last chapter of the book turned into another book entirely with all the richness of detail we saw in this book.
