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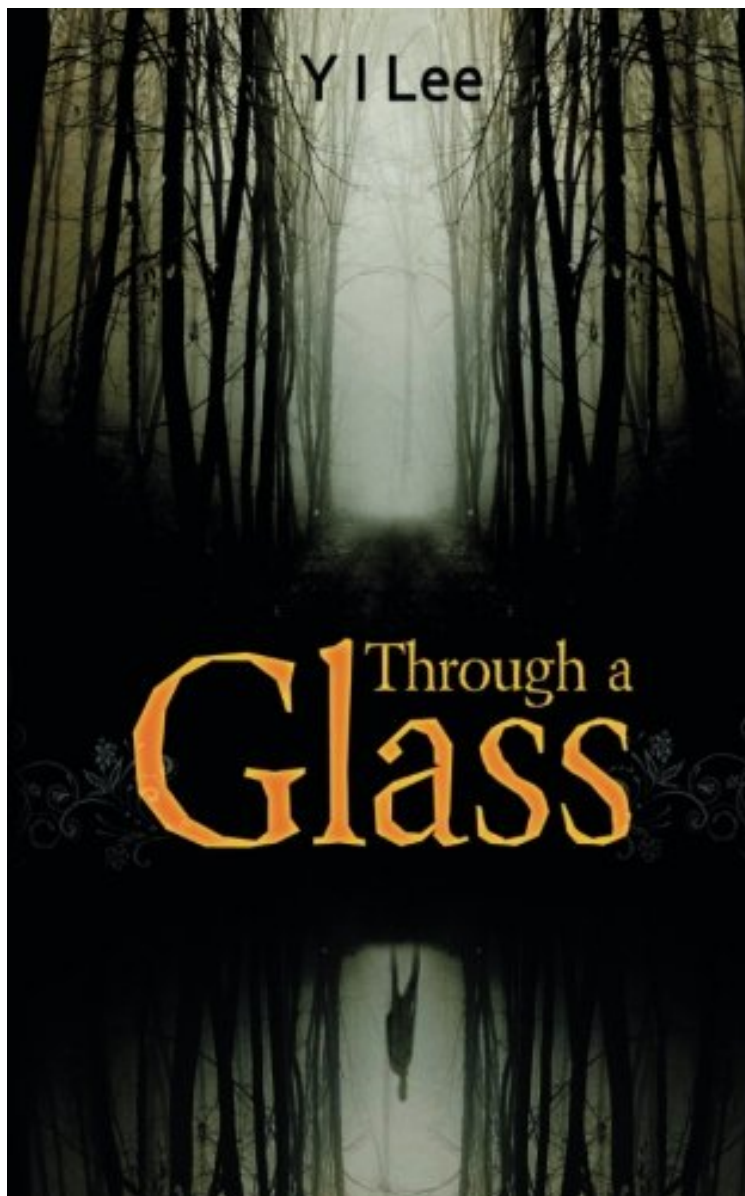

There was little or no character development, and even the main character's alcoholism was swept quickly under the rug. It was written in the style of junior high fan fiction, with little description or explanation of the scenes and people presented. What was happening to Irene with her spirituality? How did she conquer her drinking problem?
