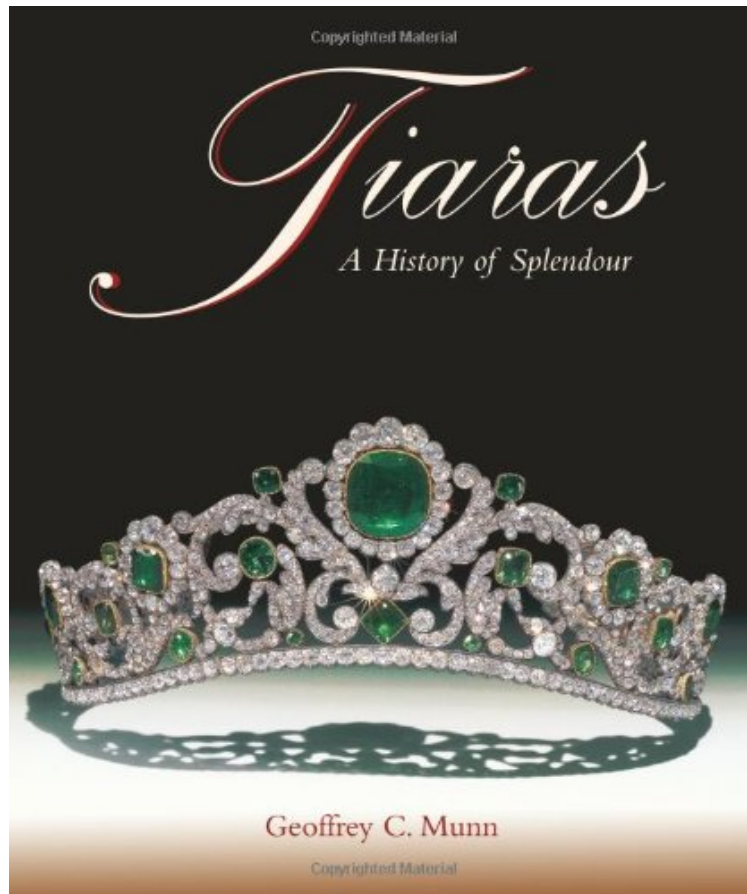

Unfortunately, there are only three books in total that are specifically about tiaras. This one, Munn's other book Tiaras Past and Present, and Diana Scarsbrick's Tiara. All three are good books and resources on tiaras but this is definitely the most comprehensive and the largest. I think it weighs 5 pounds! It really is a wonderful read with lots of pictures but as others have noted, the pictures do not line up with the text and you will shuffle a bit.The historical tidbits were fascinating and it really is sad that this is a lost art. It's also very disappointing to find that so many famous tiaras have been converted into other items or sold at auction. Since tiaras are so eye-catching, most people used their very best jewels in them because they would be seen. These days there aren't many ruling monarchs or formal events where tiaras are required. The opening of Parliament in England and the Nobel Prize Ceremony are the only two. There are wonderful royal events, particularly with the Swedish and Danish royal families. Some of the newer princesses have had new tiaras designed for them but nowhere near on the scale that

it used to be. Munn really conveys that there was a golden age of tiaras and that unfortunately that time has passed. If you're a Tiara Tuesday enthusiast, this is a valuable must have book. There are a lot of tiaras that you can find online for sale but trying to match the tiara to its owner can be quite an adventure! The photos in this book are clear and detailed so that you can figure out which tiara you have. Some of them are very famous, like Queen Elizabeth's Girls of Great Britain and Ireland tiara which she wears all the time. However, there are photos of Mary of Teck wearing the Teck Crescent tiara and no one has seen that in decades. Geoffrey Munn has been granted special access to the photographic archives of many famous jewellers, including Cartier, Boucheron and Fabergé, for his research. Other makers include Castellani, Fouquet, Garrards, Giuliano, Lalique, and Tiffany. Among the contemporary pieces illustrated are tiaras belonging to Jamie Lee Curtis, Vivienne Westwood, Elton John and Madonna, made by Slim Barratt, Galliano and Versace.
