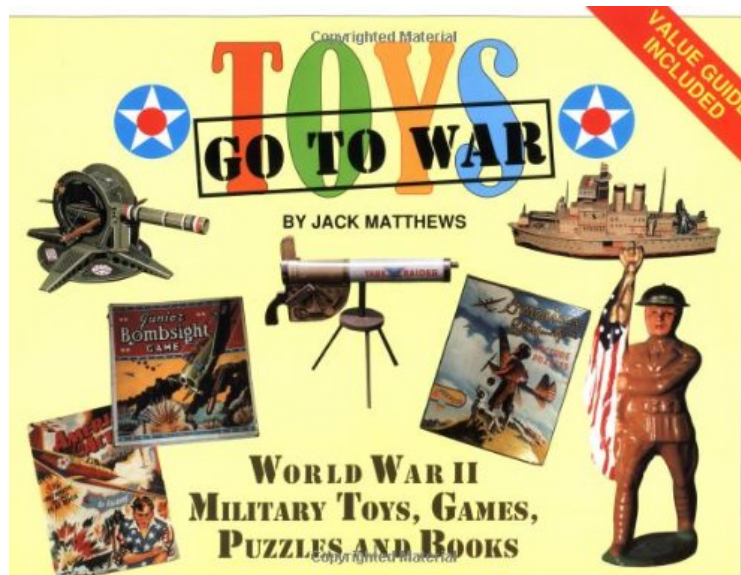

Furthermore, I simply enjoyed it. My one complaint is the horizontal format which makes it difficult to read.
