The photographs are all close-ups of picked-apart kimono fragments, many of them photographed repeatedly to provide (unnecessary) additional detail. The fabrics themselves represent an extremely narrow range of silks produced during the period in question, clustering at the low end of the quality spectrum; many are discolored. The organization of sections, ostensibly along the lines of main motifs, bears almost no relation to their actual content. Notably absent are descriptions of weaving and dyeing techniques for most of the fabrics, and some motifs are incorrectly identified. A reasonable addition to round out an already adequate library, but if you want a more representative and/or informative survey, look to Japanese publications. More than 400 photographs and detailed captions provide information on motif identification, Japanese history and cultural traditions. The book is organized around favorite Japanese motifs, including cherry blossoms, peonies, maple leaves, bamboo shoots, waves, and clouds. It will be a source of ideas and inspiration for collectors, designers, quilters, and historians. A glossary of related terms, antique fabric resources, and a substantial bibliography point the way to further reading and study.
